"In a growth mindset, people believe that their most basic abilities can be developed through dedication and hard work--brains and talent are just the starting point. This view creates a love of learning and a resilience that is essential for great accomplishment," writes Dweck. Students who embrace growth mindsets--the belief that they can learn more or become smarter if they work hard and persevere--may learn more, learn it more quickly, and view challenges and failures as opportunities to improve their learning and skills.

#### Soulful experience 3:

How many more places are you allowed to listen to Mark Teague, Brian Selznick, Dan Santat, Jewell Parker Rhodes, and Pam Munoz Ryan pay honor to their teachers through the sharing own journey their to accomplished soul-inspiring authorship? It was each author and fascinating to listen as recounted their individual literacy journey. Each story moved me--sometimes to laughter. sometimes to tears, but always to a reflective spot where I was reminded of just how varied children's experiences are and how those experiences deeply impact their writing.

#### Soulful experience 4:

My soul-calming time came as I visited with representatives from numerous companies about the philosophy behind and the intent of their educational products and/or services. The expansive nature of the exhibit hall alone served as a reminder of all the stakeholders who are eager and positioned to team with teachers as we work to achieve the #800MilltoNil initiative established by ILA--reducing the staggering count of illiterate individuals worldwide from 800 million to NILL.



#### Soulful experience 5:

Attending sessions (over 300 to choose from!) provided me time to reflect on the varied roles I have served in my career. One session, in particular, highlighted the complexities of our educational system, a system that until recently has fostered little conversations between the varied stakeholders. Cultivating Literacy Achievement Through Quality **Teacher** Preparation was a thought-provoking session that brought together individuals from higher education, K-12 schools, state departments, and accrediting bodies. It was a soul-stirring two hours during which tough topics were tackled. I invite particularly those colleages in higher education the event to watch https://ilamedia.eduvision.tv/default.aspx, share it with colleagues, and to then continue engaging in conversations about how we can ensure that all classrooms are equipped with dynamic literacy educators.

#### Soulful experience 6:

Laughing, reconnecting, meeting, and talking "shop" with MN colleagues old and new...soul-enriched.

These are just a few of the experiences I, along with over 6,000 educators from around the world, was fortunate enough to be a part of during the 2015 conference which was guided by the theme Transforming Lives Through Literacy. I think the words, shared in Dan Santat's new Caldecott award winning book The Adventures of Beekle: The Unimaginary Friend capture the experiences of many attending this soulful event: "...[we] had many new adventures. [We] shared many snacks. [We] told many jokes. The world began to feel a little less strange. And together [we dreamed of doing] the unimaginable."

# **Grant Information**

#### 2016 Available Grants

MRA Classroom Grant for Innovative Practices. This is a grant of \$1,000 that is awarded to teachers who are looking to try new and creative approaches to teaching literacy. We give out two of these each year.

<u>Joe Jubert Classroom Grant</u>. This is a classroom grant of \$1,000 for programs that specifically helps boys get into books.

<u>Joe Jubert Book Club Grant</u>. We offer three of these \$350 grants to book clubs that, again, focus on getting boys into books.

Karen Lamb Johnson Scholarship. This is a \$250 scholarship awarded to the son or daughter of a current MRA member who is seeking a degree in education.

Winners will be recognized at our Celebrate Literacy Event on March 4<sup>th</sup>.

This work verified just how important it is to believe in all students and their ability to learn. That's an easy thing to say that, but what that actually looks like in your school and classroom is another challenge. Our students can be very resilient in many aspects of their lives such as sports, music, and other things that are important and of high interest to them. Learning often does not follow that same track. Students become frustrated, give up and fear failure. It has become our job as educators to work with students to develop an understanding of learning, making mistakes and then learning again from those mistakes. If a student never struggles, it makes me wonder if that student is being challenged. If they are never challenged, it is hard for them to learn to be resilient.

This year, try incorporating the word "yet" into the conversations with your students. Telling students that they don't have it "yet", gives them the impression that they will get it. Praising the effort rather than the outcome is also an important part of the growth mindset. Mary Cay Ricci, author of **Mindsets in the Classroom** says it this way, "When adults praise what a child 'is', such as tall or smart, the children attribute their accomplishment to a fixed trait they were born with. When adults praise actions or tasks that children 'do', the children attribute their accomplishment to their own effort."

As you start a new school year, I wish you much happiness and success. Minnesota Reading Association is here to serve you. If you know of ways that we can help and support literacy in the state of Minnesota, I would love to hear from you.



### Writers Are Readers - Young Author Celebration 2016

The Minnesota Reading Association is again sponsoring a creative writing award for the K-12 students of our members. Students may submit an original manuscript (fiction or nonfiction) piece to be enjoyed by their peers. Winners will be recognized on the MRA website as well as at our Celebrate Literacy Reception on March 4, 2016. Students have the opportunity to showcase their creativity and enthusiasm for writing to entertain or inform other readers.

The writing submitted can be fiction or nonfiction from any genre (adventure, make-believe, poetry, prose, etc.) but some ideas include:

- a story about something that happened in the writer's family
- a biography of a famous person (including sources or references)
- an original poem
- a news story about a historical event, written as if the writer were a reporter witnessing the event
- a description of a life-changing event

#### **Guidelines:**

- 1. Writers must do their own work.
- 2. The audience for this writing will be other students.
- 3. Teachers may help students with the writing process, as this is a learning experience. Encourage rewriting and editing.
- 4. Kindergarten and 1st grade students may dictate a story to an adult if the student's writing skills are still being developed.
- 5. Work may be entered in the modified category if the student is on an IEP for language arts.
- 6. Entries must be typed.
- 7. Entries will be judged according to creativity, originality, organization, and mechanics.
- 8. Judging will be done by grade level, according to these specifications:
  - a. K-3 around 500 words or less
  - b. 4-6 around 750 words or less
  - c. 7-9 around 1000 words or less
  - d. 10-12 around 1200 words or less
- 9. Winners from each category will be notified by mail, and will be invited to the MRA Celebrate Literacy Reception on March 4, 2016.

#### 11. Deadline for entries is January 1, 2016.

- 12. When submitting the manuscript include the following information:
  - a. Name of student
  - b. Grade
  - c. Teacher's name
  - d. Phone number and/or email address of teacher
  - e. Full name and address of school
